Parent Drop-Off and Pick-Up

- To help protect our young students and staff, we are making a few adjustments this year.
 - Staff will greet children outside preschool as they arrive.
 - Parents are asked to park their cars and walk their child to the door where there will be a staff member to greet the students.
 - We will still have a parent helper present each day to assist students entering the building and get situated.
 - At the end of the day, staff will walk all children outside to meet their parent(s). Parents should be at the door at 11:45AM for morning class at 3:15PM for afternoon class.
- At the entrance of the preschool, we will provide hand sanitizer with at least 60% alcohol. Hand sanitizer will be kept out of children's reach and staff will supervise use.

Screen Children & Parent Volunteer Upon Arrival

- Staff members will take each child's temperature upon arrival. Students who have a fever of 100.4° (38.0°C) or above or other signs of illness will not be admitted to the preschool. Parents are to be on the alert for signs of illness in their children and to keep them home when they are sick. Signs of illness include fever, cough, running nose, vomiting & diarrhea.
- Staff & students will wash their hands frequently and hand sanitizer will be readily available.
- Students that have not arrived by 9:10AM for our morning students and 12:40PM for our afternoon students, will not be permitted to enter the school that day.

Disinfecting & Cleaning

- All Saints Parish uses several products to help reduce the spread of germs. We are guided by CDC and Archdiocese of Indianapolis to use products that are listed as effective against Sars/Cov-2, the virus that causes Covid-19.
- For the past several months we have used regular household bleach diluted with water, Clorox wipes, and Lysol multi-surface cleaner to disinfect our buildings. We recently began using a non-chlorine-based disinfectant named Avistat which is approved by the CDC along with the use of the bleach. We will continue to use Clorox wipes, Lysol multi-surface cleaning and add Lysol disinfecting spray to our list of approved products for the preschool building.
- Staff will disinfect during each class and between morning and afternoon classes with the above referenced products. Special attention is given to high touch surfaces. The entire building will be disinfected at the end of the day.
- Windows will be open when possible for additional ventilation.
- A parent helper will be present each day to assist with disinfecting.

Face Masks/ Face Coverings

- Staff members and parent helpers are expected to wear masks when 6 feet of social distancing cannot be maintained.

- Students are not required to wear masks at this time but encouraged to if they are comfortable. This could change if a state mandate is introduced. Students that choose to wear masks will be offered breaks where they can remove their mask.

COVID-19 Symptoms/Exclusion from School

Students and staff will be excluded from school if they test positive for COVID-19, have a fever of 100.4 or higher, or exhibit an abnormal or severe case of one or more of the other symptoms of COVID-19 if the symptoms are not otherwise explained and documented. All students with a fever of 100.4 or higher must be excluded from school. Parents are expected to screen at home. Other symptoms must be abnormal or severe, or not otherwise explained. For example, several of the symptoms can be caused by seasonal allergies. You know your students and whether a symptom is abnormal or severe. Please do not send your student to school if they are exhibiting a COVID-19 symptom that is abnormal or severe.

Tested Positive for Covid 19- Symptomatic Persons who experienced symptoms and have tested positive for COVID-19 may return to school if all of the following conditions are met:

- The individual no longer has a fever (without the use of medicine that reduces fevers); and
- Other symptoms have improved (for example, when your cough or shortness of breath have improved); and
- At least ten (10) calendar days have passed since symptoms first appeared.

Tested Negative - Symptomatic Persons who experienced symptoms and have tested negative for COVID-19 may return to school if all of the following conditions are met:

- The individual has not had a fever for at least 72 hours (three full days of no fever without the use of medicine that reduces fevers); and
- Other symptoms have improved (for example, when your cough or shortness of breath have improved); and
- At least ten (10) calendar days have passed since the symptoms first appeared; or
- A note from the provider stating the individual has an alternate diagnosis and the provider believes it's appropriate for the student to return to school.

Tested Positive- Asymptomatic Persons who have not experienced symptoms but have tested positive for COVID-19 may return to school if all of the following conditions are met:

- At least ten (10) calendar days have passed since the day of the test.
- If a person becomes symptomatic, they must follow the “Tested Positive - Symptomatic” protocol from the day they become symptomatic.
- At least fourteen (14) calendar days have passed since the day of close contact.

Parent Q &A

Question: What if my child has common cold symptoms? Should I send them to school?

Answer: The CDC recommends children stay home with any of the following symptoms.

• A fever of 100.4° F or greater • Cough • Shortness of breath or difficulty breathing • Chills • Muscle pain • Headache • New loss of taste or smell • Sore throat • Fatigue • Congestion or runny nose • Nausea or vomiting • Diarrhea

Question: If a child in my child's class tests positive, does the entire class stay home?

Answer: Students who were within six (6) feet for fifteen (15) minutes or longer are considered a close contact and should remain at home. Your teacher will address this on a case by case basis to determine if your child was exposed.

Question: If a child in preschool tests positive, how will I be notified?

Answer: It is the Dearborn County Health Department's responsibility to notify parents regarding close contact or positive COVID-19. We will rely on their guidance and assist with the communication.

Question: Will the school be closing anytime there is a sick child in any of the different schools?

Answer: At this time, we do not plan on closing should we have a positive case. We have protocols in place that allow us to deep clean our school as necessary.

Question: Will field trips still take place this school year?

Answer: Our hope is that we can schedule field trips but we cannot guarantee them. We have already made contact with Wendall's pumpkin patch and plan on that for this fall.

Question: Since Sunman Dearborn Schools are doing e-learning on fall break and the first week of spring break, will preschool be in session?

Answer: Currently, our plan is to not be in session during fall break but we plan on being in session during the first week of spring break.

Question: Will school still be in session when Sunman-Dearborn schools is closed for snow days since Sunman-Dearborn is doing e-learning days for snow days?

Answer: No, preschool will be closed whenever Sunman-Dearborn has a snow day to ensure the safety of our families.

Question: Will there be an online option for preschool should Sunman-Dearborn shut down for an extended period of time?

Answer: Given the age of our students, we will not offer any online options in the event Sunman-Dearborn faces an extended closure. You will not be charged tuition should this occur.
